

Key Knowledge

- Humans were made for relationship with God
- God is the great rescuer, who also came to each in the person of Jesus, the Saviour
- Jesus' life, death and resurrection enable a new relationship with God for all, and are at the centre of his rescue plan
- Through his death, Jesus rescued people from sin
- In his resurrection, Jesus rescued people from death
- That this story of salvation has an impact on Christians lives

Prior Learning / Future Learning

Previously, we should understand the Easter story from the Bible
That we understand Jesus is God in human form and that he is called the saviour by many Christians

This unit aims to deepen our understanding of Christianity

Vocabulary

Old testament: the first part of the Bible, covering the time before Jesus.

New testament: the second part of the Bible containing stories about Jesus and his teachings

Sin: choosing to go against the will and laws of God

Free will: the Christian belief that God have human kind the ability to choose for themselves what is right and good

Rescue: the act of being saved

Saviour: one of the names that Christians have for Jesus

Christianity: Salvation
